The institution provides high quality education, wherever and however its offerings are delivered.

Core Components

- **3.A.** The institution's degree programs are appropriate to higher education. **Subcomponent key terms:** consortium agreement; dual degree; differentiated learning goals for undergraduate and graduate programs; program accreditation; program currency; program assessment; rigor; placement outcomes in employment, graduate and professional schools.
- **3.B.** The institution demonstrates that the exercise of intellectual inquiry and the acquisition, application, and integration of broad learning and skills are integral to its educational programs.

Subcomponent key terms: Academic learning goals; Global engagement; Integrative core curriculum; Jesuit tradition and institutional mission reflected in core; assessment.

3.C. The institution has the faculty and staff needed for effective high-quality programs and student services.

Subcomponent key terms: faculty/student ratio; tenure and promotion guidelines; assessment and Academic Program Review; Academic Advising; Student Accessibility Services; Center for Diversity and Inclusion; University Counseling Center; Center for Teaching and Learning; professional development opportunities.

- **3.D.** The institution provides support for student learning and effective teaching. **Subcomponent key terms:** Center for Teaching and Learning; Learning Commons; Writing Center; Academic Coaching; Center for Digital Media; academic advising for pre-major, major, and special programs; Grasselli Library; tutoring
- **3.E.** The institution fulfills the claims it makes for an enriched environment. **Subcomponent key terms:** Athletics; Center for Service and Social Action; Campus Ministry; Research and internships including Cleveland Clinic, NBC's Meet the Press, World Food Bank; Leadership development.

Work To Date
