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Purpose of APRs


An in-depth examination of

- Curriculum
 - Is it current?
 - Does it meet national standards (if any exist)?
 - When was it last revised? Why?
- Assessment of student performance and achievement
- Resource evaluation
 - Student support (library, advising), faculty (FT & PT), space, equipment
- Strengths/weaknesses
- Improvement of educational quality and strategies to ensure it
- ACTION PLAN

Myths, misconceptions, and mistakes

- Program review = program elimination
 - Every program will do it, so elimination cannot be the motivation
- Invite your friends to come pat you on the back
 - Careful, critical review by external reviewers is the best kind of support for your program
- Faculty will only ask for more faculty, money, etc.
 - Maybe...but a justification with DATA is needed to make these arguments
- Nothing happens to "close the loop"
 - The Dean (new Dean if not completed yet = chance to shine!?!) and Provost will see all programs over ~I year. There will clearly be some follow up
- Isolated exercise-will not impact anyone else
 - The student educational experience is at the heart of this process. EVERYTHING we do is for the students!

Why an Aspirational Reviewer

- You want to get better. Why not ask directions from someone who "lives" in the area?
- My experience at Marymount University:
 - Administration
 - How to be distinctive?
 - Can credit hours be reduced? How can students minor?
 - What resources (human or other) are missing or needed?
 - Faculty
 - Advising issues (now professional advisors)-advocate for move back?
 - Do our faculty expertise match our student population?
 - Students
 - > PT in labs, FT in lecture = total disconnect of content
 - Courses that they would like to take
 - Curriculum navigation
