Typical Assessment Process

Faculty members in the philosophy department who are not teaching a senior seminar are asked to choose one class to assess for the Core. They then select at least one assignment that addresses each learning goal (with the a strong likelihood that one assignment will address all goals). As part of (or parallel to) grading those assignments, the faculty member completes the committee-approved rubric and then provides the scores as well as the original student work to the Core Committee. The assessment meeting, held at the end of the Spring semester each year, focuses on data from the previous spring semester and the most recent fall semester. (Preliminary instructor-produced data for the current semester is also examined when available.)

Deviations from the Assessment Process

Because fall 2015 was the first semester of the new integrative core, there were no integrative core classes offered in spring 2015. The procedures and policies for assessing Philosophy courses were put in place during the fall semester of 2015; therefore, there is no assessment data from fall 2015 and only preliminary data from spring 2016.
