Rachael Greuber

Rachael Greuber is the daughter of John and Lori Greuber originally from Watkins Glen, New York. She is a major in Sociology and Criminology, and minoring in Forensic Behavioral Science. After college, Rachael plans to pursue a career in conflict stabilization.

Leadership

As a student, Rachael has created John Carroll's chapter of STAND, an international organization that works to raise awareness about genocide and put an end to current-day mass atrocities. Last spring, she organized "One Million Bones," an event in which the main quad of campus was covered with clay bones and signs offering facts regarding current day genocides. Rachael is also a group leader of the Sociology Student Association and was awarded the Outstanding Junior Award from her department last year. Greuber was also one out of 30 women selected to participate in the John Glenn School of Public Affairs program designed to address the underrepresentation of women in politics. At this program, she received training in running and organizing a campaign, networking, and public speaking. Rachael also ran Cross Country for three years and track for two years.

Commitment to Christian Values

Rachael joined a CLC her freshman year and has been a CLC leader ever since. She attended the Guidance 11 retreat, and will be attending Manresa this spring. Greuber has attended the Ignatian Family Teach-In for Justice in DC the past two years, and is currently participating in one-on-one spiritual advising. As a sophomore at Carroll, Rachael was confirmed into the Catholic Church.

Academic Achievement

While at Carroll, Rachael has been on the Dean's List since her sophomore year. She was inducted into Alpha Kappa Delta as a junior, the Sociology Honor Society. In the summer of 2012, Rachael interned with the US Marshals Service in Washington, D.C. Greuber spent the summer of 2013 in Cleveland interning with the U.S. Secret Service, and this fall, Rachael returned to DC to intern with the US Dept. of State in both Diplomatic Security and Conflict and Stabilization Operations. In January 2014 Rachael went to Hawaii in to present a research paper she wrote at the Honolulu International Conference on Arts and Humanities. Her paper was about women's empowerment and economic development in India, Pakistan, Saudi Arabia, and the Congo. Greuber will present her research at "Celebration of Scholarship" this spring.

Service

Rachael has been committed to service all four years at Carroll. She has committed herself to the *We, the People* program since she was a freshman, tutoring fourth and fifth grade students in inner city Cleveland every week. She has been a co-organizer of Take Back the Night, an organization that is dedicated to speaking out against sexual violence and advocating for change. Rachael also went on an immersion trip to El Salvador in 2012, and spent this past spring break on the STLF service trip. Additionally, Rachael has participated in the Jesuit Day of Service, Footprints for Fatima, and Through the Eyes of the Child.
