This is an 18-hour certificate program designed to help professionals at the master's or post-master's level to develop skills in quantitative and qualitative research methods, assessment, measurement, program evaluation, and data-based decision-making. - The English Department is offering a new course in spring 2009 entitled: Shakespeare on Film: Distance Education Course (EN 580) taught by Dr. Chris Roark. This hybrid/on-line course will explore six of Shakespeare's Plays on film (Much Ado About Nothing, Henry 5, Julius Caesar, Hamlet, Othello, and Macbeth). The purpose of the course is to bring a variety of perspectives to understanding what happens when a dramatic work is transferred to film. The course focuses on these questions: In what ways is film an appropriate medium for a Shakespearean play, and in what ways is it problematic? What is gained and what is lost when Shakespeare is put on the big screen? How do different directors and different film versions treat the same play? This is a low residency course that will meet on campus five times during the term on Wednesday nights from 5-7:45 (Jan 14, February 4, February 25, March 11, April 15) and during final exam week. The on-line components of the course will include weekly discussion groups, a variety of exercises, and a research paper. For more information contact Dr. Chris Roark at croark@jcu.edu.
- In order to address the complexities of diversity in nonprofit management and enhance students' cultural competence and sensitivity, the Nonprofit Administration Program is offering a new course entitled Cultural Diversity Training (NP 555). Guided by developing cultural self-awareness, students will become more responsive to diverse groups of people in order to create common ground for furthering mutual goals among colleagues and clients. Guest experts, classroom discussions, case-based simulations, and in-depth readings will help students further their understanding of age, disability, gender, race, sexual orientation and socioeconomic backgrounds. Spotlight On: School Psychology

Located in the *Department of Education and Allied Studies*, the JCU School Psychology Program trains graduate level School Psychologists to work with children and adolescents in educational settings. Our specialist level program is approved by the National Association of School Psychologists (NASP) and prepares graduates to meet state and national certification requirements.

School psychologists provide both direct and indirect services to help children succeed academically, socially, and emotionally. They collaborate with educators, parents, school counselors, and other professionals to create safe, healthy, and supportive learning environments for all students. Typical services provided by school psychologists include evaluation, consultation, intervention, prevention, research, and planning.

School psychologists are highly trained in both psychology and education, and come from a variety of undergraduate backgrounds. JCU School Psychology students must complete a graduate program emphasizing preparation in data-based decision making, consultation and collaboration, effective instruction, child development, student diversity and development, prevention, intervention, mental health, learning styles, behavior, research, and program evaluation.

The JCU School Psychology Program is a three year training program consisting of 70 semester hours, which includes a paid internship. After completing a comprehensive exam during the second year, students are awarded a Master's degree. Upon successful completion of all course and internship requirements, students receive a Certificate of Advanced Graduate Studies (CAGS). Program graduates who pass a national exam meet state and national certification requirements for the practice of School Psychology.

Training in School Psychology offers a rewarding career and an excellent job market. U.S. News and World Report recently included school psychology in their list of the Best Careers of 2008. The median salary for school psychologists was reported as \$62,600. The article also gave school psychology the highest possible rating for job market outlook and prestige.

Meet the Program Faculty

Jeanne Jenkins, Ph.D., a member of the Department of Education and Allied Studies since 1992 received her master's and specialist level training from Edinboro University of Pennsylvania and a second master's and doctorate in Educational Psychology from Cornell University. Dr. Jenkins has served as the coordinator of the School Psychology Program for 16 years. Dr. Jenkins's current research interests include school psychology supervision and emotionally healthy educational environments with a focus on the contextual aspects of affectively-toned cognitions. Her publications and presentations have focused on chronically ill children, substance abuse, use of brief assessment measures, and supervision. Prior to coming to John Carroll, she was the lead early childhood teacher at a university child development center. Following graduate school, she worked as a school psychologist in both Ohio and New York State, teaching and research assistant at Cornell University, researcher for a large children of divorce project, and chief evaluator for a federally funded drug and alcohol project, and assistant professor. She also has worked as a licensed school psychologist in private practice.

Ryan Allen, Ph.D. joined the JCU faculty in 2008 as an assistant professor in the Department of Education and Allied Studies. Dr. Allen earned his Ph.D. in School Psychology from Ball State University. Prior to coming to JCU, Dr. Allen was an assistant professor at Youngstown State University and the Citadel. Dr. Allen has experience as a practicing School Psychologist in the public

Meet the Deans

In June 2008 the College of Arts and Sciences under the leadership of its dean, assumed responsibility for all graduate programs housed in its academic departments, in addition to two programs jointly sponsored with the Boler School of Business. At that time, the position of Associate Dean for Graduate Studies in the College of Arts and Sciences was established. We want you to have the opportunity to meet the academic leaders of our graduate programs.

Dr. Linda Eisenmann is Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, as well as Professor of History and of Education. A native of Cleveland and a first-generation college student, Eisenmann earned her B.A. in English, *summa cum laude* and Phi Beta Kappa, from Connecticut College in New London, Connecticut (1975). She then earned a master's degree in American Literature at Georgetown University (1977) before turning to the study of education. She completed a second master's degree (1981) and a doctorate in the History of Education at the Harvard University Graduate School of Education (1987).

A historian interested in the social context of higher education, Eisenmann's scholarship examines three areas of educational history: women's experiences, professionalization, and historiography. Her recent book, *Higher Education for Women in Postwar America, 1945-1965* (Johns Hopkins University Press, 2006), explores the impact of cultural expectations on women's collegiate experience in the postwar era. Her edited volume, *Historical Dictionary of Women's Education in the United States* (Greenwood Press, 1998), offers a reader-friendly analysis of available research. Eisenmann has published widely, including in *Teachers College Record, Academe, History of Education Quarterly, Educational Foundations, Metropolitan Universities*, and *Thought and Action*, among other venues.

Before joining the John Carroll community, Eisenmann was Professor of Education and former director of the doctoral program in Higher Education Administration at the University of Massachusetts Boston. She has previously taught at Harvard University, Wellesley College, and Bowdoin College, and has held several administrative posts in higher education, including assistant director of a research center at Radcliffe College.

Dr. Mark Storz was appointed Associate Dean for Graduate Studies in June, 2008. Prior to assuming this position, Storz was a member of John Carroll University's Department of Education and Allied Studies for ten years where he served as a teacher educator and most recently, as associate department chair. Storz earned his B.A. in social studies education at Manhattan College in the Bronx (1978). He has earned two master's degrees, a M.S. in Reading Education from Syracuse University (1985) and a M.A. in Educational Leadership from Eastern Michigan University (1990). His doctorate is in Urban Education with a specialization in learning and development from Cleveland State University (1998).

Prior to coming to JCU, Storz served as a principal of a Pre-K through 8th grade Catholic school in Flint, Michigan. He also served as assistant principal and teacher at two Christian Brothers Academies in Syracuse and Albany, New York.

Storz's main research interest has focused on the perspectives of urban middle school students regarding the quality of their educational experiences. His recent book with co-author Karen R. Nestor, *They Call Us To Justice: Responding to the Call of the Church and our Students*, uses the words and experiences of students they interviewed to enliven the rich tradition of Catholic Social Teaching for Catholic educators.
