Graduate Education in the Jesuit Network By the Numbers

Graduate and professional education at John Carroll University is part of a long tradition within the network of Jesuit colleges and universities in the United States and around the world. According to Father Charles Currie, President of the Association of Jesuit Colleges and Universities, 36% of the total enrollment in Jesuit institutions of higher education in the US today is comprised of graduate students. In the College of Arts and Sciences at John Carroll, almost 20% of students enrolled are graduate students. Of the 28 Jesuit colleges and universities in the US, all but one are involved in graduate and professional education. Consider the following: according to Father Currie, Jesuit colleges and universities administer four medical schools, three dental schools, 14 law schools, 20 nursing and health education programs, 27 business schools, 14 education schools and departments, eight engineering schools, five schools of social service, and one school of foreign service.

- TEACH Grant Program—Beginning with the 2009-2010 academic year, John Carroll will begin to participate in the TEACH Grant Program for all graduate students pursuing the Masters of Education and Initial Teacher Licensure. Through the College Cost Reduction and Access Act of 2007, Congress created the Teacher Education Assistance for College and Higher Education (TEACH) Grant Program that provides grants of up to \$4000 per year to students who intend to teach in a public or private elementary or secondary school that serves students from low-income families. In exchange for receiving a TEACH grant, a recipient must agree to serve as a full-time teacher in a high-need field in a school that serves low income students for at least four academic years. Graduate Enrollment- At a recent Association of Jesuit Colleges and Universities (AJCU) Graduate Meeting held at Loyola College in Baltimore, Fr. Charles Curry, President of AJCU, reported that approximately 35% of the enrollment at US Jesuit Colleges and Universities was comprised of graduate students (this includes colleges/universities with small programs as well as those with medical and law schools). In the College of Arts and Sciences at John Carroll University, almost 20% of students enrolled are graduate students. Graduate enrollment in the College has remained steady; and in fact, increased almost 15% in the spring 2009 semester.

Spotlight On: Humanities Program- at the core of Jesuit Education

According to Ronald Modras*, a professor of theological studies at St. Louis University, the Jesuit 's partiality for the humanities and the ideal of educating the whole person is rooted in the classics and good literature. It is within that tradition that the Master's of Arts in Humanities can be found. Developed in 1988, more than 150 graduates have completed this program designed for persons 'seeking to deepen their understanding of cultural and ethics topics and who regard the liberal arts as subjects of lifelong learning.' Consistent with the University's mission and that of Graduate Studies in the College of Arts and Sciences, the Humanities Program prepares advanced students "to be intellectual and professional leaders who fully utilize their skills and abilities to make positive contributions to their professions and society."

The MA in Humanities is an interdisciplinary degree in which students pursue courses on a selected theme from various humanities fields: Art History, Classics, English, History, Languages, Literature, Philosophy and Religious Studies. Each student designs, with faculty guidance, a plan of study that includes: (1) two required courses that provide an overview of the Humanities from the Classical period through the 19th century; and (2) a series of elective courses that meet the various needs and interests of the students enrolled in the program. Students may pursue a program that is chronologically based (i.e. medieval, modern), geographically-based (i.e. Europe, America), or thematic (i.e. Comparative Cultures, Society and Ethics). These themes enable students to build relationships between courses and can be pursued through the wide latitude allowed in the selection of course papers and readings. For example, a student electing European Studies may pursue a theme of women's roles. A student interested in English and American Culture could emphasize the Victorian period; another taking Religion, Culture and Ethics could focus on ethics in modern society.

This program is attractive to teachers who wish to broaden their teaching repertoires while fulfilling the mandates of the state of Ohio for renewal of teacher licensure. Professionals in other fields who are seeking a larger cultural and/or ethical context for their professional lives may also find this program appropriate for their on-going professional development. Designed for both traditional and non-traditional students, the MA in Humanities Program provides full or part time students the opportunity to engage in rigorous, challenging and in-depth study.

Faculty teaching in the program come from a number of academic departments within the College of Arts and Sciences. The program is under the direction of Francis X. Ryan, S.J., D.Phil. Fr. Ryan, also chair of the Department of English, holds an AB in Philosophy and Greek, St. Louis University; Bachelor of Divinity, Milltown Institute, Dublin, Ireland; MA in English Literature, St. Louis University; M. Stud., Oxford University; and D Phil, Oxford University . Dr. Ryan teaches Middle English Literature, Tudor Literature, and the Bible as Literature.
