CONGRATULATIONS - STUDENT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Presentations:

ON A PERSONAL NOTE

On July 1, 2014, I will be stepping down as Associate Dean for Graduate Studies and returning to the faculty in the Department of Education and School Psychology which had been my home for the previous ten years. These past six years have been wonderful and I am grateful for having had the opportunity to serve the University and its students, faculty, and staff, in this capacity. I am thankful for all of the support that the students and faculty have given me during my tenure as dean. I am particularly grateful to Pat Pitingolo, Vivienne Porter, and Terry Bradley, who daily work so hard for our graduate programs and students. Finally I want to extend gratitude to Dr. Jeanne Colleran, our Dean, for her trust, confidence, and support of my work.

There will be changes in the administrative structure of the College beginning in July which will affect the administration of graduate programs. The College will be comprised of three divisions and each of these divisions will have an associate dean who will oversee both undergraduate and graduate education. The Office of Graduate Studies will operate as it does currently. Two of the three deans have been identified and the third will be in place by July 1. Dr. Pam Mason, currently Associate Dean for the College of Arts and Sciences will assume the role of Associate Dean for Social Sciences, Education, Counseling and Global Studies and will oversee the graduate programs in Counseling, Education, School Psychology, and Nonprofit Administration. Dr. Graciela Lacueva, currently chair of the Physics Department, will be the Associate Dean for Science, Mathematics, and Health and will oversee the graduate programs in Mathematics and Biology. The Associate Dean of Humanities will oversee graduate programs in Communication, English, Humanities, and Theology and Religious Studies. More information on this change will be forthcoming.
