Three Jesuit institutions of higher learning, Fairfield University, Georgetown University and the Universidad Centroamericana (UCA, Managua, Nicaragua) are partnering in a three-year collaborative grant that uses humanitarian action and JUHAN as a conduit to integrate civic and moral responsibility into their undergraduate curriculum. Through the JUHAN platform, each partner aims to develop an institutionally appropriate model for each school to equip students to deal more effectively with some of the large clusters of “great questions” of meaning and value, and of moral

responsibility. Each school's activities have included faculty and professional learning communities and student initiatives, assessment activities, and the development of a JUHAN Learning System website to serve as an electronic toolkit. A demonstration of the JUHAN Learning System will be provided during the panel.
