ROTC cadets meet high ranking army officers in D.C.

Seniors David Haas, David Laubert, Gino Lamantia and Matt Comiskey, cadets in the ROTC program, recently took a trip to Washington D.C. for the annual AUSA conference. Each year, the Association of the United States Army hosts the AUSA Annual meeting and exposition, which celebrates top leadership in the army. At the exposition, leaders in the military met to discuss the status of the military and current issues.

General Carter Ham, a John Carroll alumnus, retired four-star general and commander of U.S. AFRICOM (all American forces on the African continent), is the current president and CEO of AUSA. For a number of years, he has sponsored students of the ROTC program to attend the conference.

Lt. Col. Matthew Johnson accompanied the cadets to the nation's capital. Johnson said that there were workshops and roundtables where leaders spoke about certain topics pertaining to the military. Industry companies came in and shared their new technology and products with the military as well as foreign militaries.

"The whole conference floor is set up with everything from helicopters to different weapon systems, to ammunition, to different lotions for fighting poison ivy, to clothing, to backrubs. Anything you can think about, it's all there. The purpose of that is to connect with the military," Johnson said.

One of the evenings of the conference included a meet and greet with the Secretary of the Army and the Chief of the Army. Cadets were able to meet the top general, General Milley and the Sargent Major of the Army, General Ham, the highest enlisted person in the army, as well as the AUSA CEO president.

Haas, one of the seniors who attended the exposition, spoke highly of the conference. "We had the opportunity to meet the Secretary of the Army, The Honorable Eric K.
