THE PROGRAM

The John Carroll Young Writers Workshop will be held on the campus of John Carroll University from July 14-18, 2014, taught by John Carroll's award-winning creative writing faculty.

Students participate in a rigorous and inspiring program that provides an introduction to the art and craft of poetry, short fiction, and creative nonfiction. In morning and afternoon sessions, students study with acclaimed professors, engaging in writing exercises designed to address the elements of craft: form, voice, character, image, scene, and setting. In addition, students will participate in lively workshop sessions in which they will read and discuss each other's work with an eye toward revision. Students will also read and discuss the work of established authors, investigating the strategies they use to craft their poetry and prose. Finally, students will have a oneon-one conference with their core faculty member. We round out our week with a celebratory banquet and reading on Friday afternoon.
